## Three Key Factors to Explain Elections:

- •1. POLITICAL PARTY•2. CANDIDATES
- •3. ISSUES

## I. POLITICAL PARTIES

- Elections are Mostly about Activation, Not Persuasion
- Parties and candidates have two jobs in an election: <u>activate</u> the faithful, and <u>persuade</u> the dubious.
- This process was first identified in a pioneering study of the 1940 presidential election (Lazarsfeld, Berelson and Gaudet, *The People's Choice*) studying voters in Erie County, Ohio. They found that the chief purpose of a nationwide political campaign was to "activate [voters'] political predispositions."
- Most voters had decided how they were going to vote before the campaign began.

# This is Even More True in this Era of Heightened Political Polarization

- Why current era of polarization?
  - The two political parties are closely matched, which historically enhances polarization. Each party is dedicated to undermining the other in hopes of winning the next election.
  - When one party dominates (e.g. Republicans 1896-1928, Democrats 1932-1968), the dominant party focuses more on governance as it is less concerned with electoral defeat, and the weaker party moves closer to the dominant party in hopes of gaining support (e.g. by the 1950s Republicans had largely accepted Social Security (enacted 1935) and other New Deal era programs.
  - The current era of polarization is unlikely to subside until one party wins domination.

## **Polarization Political Dynamics**

- Political leaders play to and enhance polarization.
- Media and information "siloing" that emerged in the 1990s was greatly enhanced by the proliferation of electronic media and internet sources.
- One-time media dominance of big three networks (ABC, NBC, CBS) and print newspapers is gone, pushed aside by dozens of ideological electronic news outlets, thousands of ideological web sites, and decline/disappearance of print newspapers.



One Key Aspect of the Change: Intra-Party Takeover of the GOP

- Throughout most of this period of change, the Republican Party was dominated by its Establishment Wing (reflected in presidential nominations of Bush 1 and 2, Dole, McCain, Romney)
- Republican rebellion from within on the party's Establishment Wing

-Rise & institutionalization of the Tea Party (2009-2012)

-Nomination of Trump who captures the party in 2016


 Political war on Democrats but also on establishment Republicans.

## Cumulative Effect on Today's Parties

- **Democratic Party:** A product of its 1930s-1960s transformation the party of economic security programs, civil rights, cultural liberalism. Call it the federal party.
- Republican Party: A product of its more recent transformation the party of small government (economic sphere) & cultural conservatism. Call it the states-rights party.
- Our parties are as far apart as at nearly any time in their history. Even leading up to the Civil War, both parties (Democrats and Whigs) had sharp intra-party factional divisions: pro- and antislavery factions. No similar intra-party factions now.

# The Partisan Divide: Issue Polarization Example of Abortion Issue


Percentage of respondents saying abortion should be allowed in "all circumstances."


The Partisan Divide: Perceptual Polarization (alternative realities) Example: Global Warming

Percentage of respondents believing effects of global warming have already begun




## Partisan Sorting: Cable News Audience

## The Parties are Closely Matched: Presidency Outcomes





- Donald Trump faked having Covid-19 in order to win sympathy votes
- Joe Biden is mentally impaired
- Dr. Anthony Fauci funded a lab in Wuhan to develop the coronavirus
- If reelected, Donald Trump planned to eliminate social security and Medicare
- Kamala Harris was not born in United States
- CDC manipulated numbers to exaggerate fatalities from Covid-19
- President Trump went to the hospital while president after suffering a stroke
- Vote counting machines overcounted the Biden vote

percentage of respondents saying statement is true



• The psychological tendency to interpret claims in ways that align with our preexisting beliefs and biases.

## **II. THE CANDIDATES**

## The 2024 Political Earthquake:

- This presidential election would have been the fifth candidate rematch and second time an incumbent president has faced a former president (Grover Cleveland vs. Benjamin Harrison, 1892) had Joe Biden stayed in the race.
- July 21: Bowing to pressure from Democratic leaders in the wake of low poll numbers and poor debate performance, Biden announced withdrawal from the race.
- The rapid selection of VP Kamala Harris to replace Biden on the ticket is unprecedented in history of the presidency (nearest analogue: Lyndon Johnson's decision not to run for a second full term in March 1968).

## Harris-for-Biden Provides Rocket Fuel for Democrats and Favorable Media Coverage

• Media coverage has been slightly more favorable to Harris than Trump, even on pro-Trump Fox News. Favorable coverage isn't necessarily a story of "liberal media bias" but rather a story about how the news media reflects the "fundamentals" of a story.


• In this case, the fundamentals are clear. The Democratic Party was deeply uncertain about Biden. They had every incentive to rally behind Harris and thus showered her with enthusiasm and praise. Democrats avoided the sorts of intra-party divisions that often attract negative news coverage.

• Harris has managed to avoid major missteps, scandals, or gaffes—in part by limiting her interactions with the news media. She's not been perfect, but the memorable controversies have mostly been Trump's—such as his appearance at Arlington Cemetery or the ginned-up panic about immigrants eating pets.

• Generally, candidates who gain in the polls get more positive coverage. Good poll numbers help sustain a "winner" narrative that translates into positive coverage and a feeling of "momentum."

### Comparative Favorability Ratings After Harris Becomes Nominee


#### Favorable views of politicians

- View only the Democrat favorably






#### Harris gains support across demographics compared to Biden






## Solid bars are job growth minus effects of pandemic.

#### Job growth under Trump lagged behind Biden and Clinton


Even when the effect of the pandemic is excluded, the Trump administration's figures are lower than those of other recent presidents.


#### A shortage of workers as Americans retire


Since July 2021, the United States has had more jobs than workers to fill them.










#### The federal deficit grew during the Trump years




Harris performs better on trust with economy than Biden did.


## Which candidate voters say they trust more with the economy


Survey of 1,000 registered voters taken monthly between February and August 2024


## Average Real GDP Growth (quarterly)






# Wall Street does Fine Under Dems

#### Stock Growth During Presidential Term






#### **Consumers paid for Trump-era tariffs**

## Crime Rates: Overall Violent Crime; Crime Committed by Immigrants







#### Violent Crime Rises During COVID Pandemic

- Non-violent crime remained about the same during this period


12-month rolling average of gun violence victimizations in the U.S., January 2016–April 2024

**S. Net Oil & Petroleum Exports** Juadrillion Btu)




## Abortion Salient Issue for Democrats

 10 states have abortion referenda on the ballot in 2024, including Arizona, Colorado, Florida, Montana, Nebraska, Nevada


#### How late into pregnancy abortion is legal


## **Overall Immigration Patterns, 1850-2020**


Illegal immigration, encounters at the south-western border\*, '000

## Recent Developments: the Final Weeks

Kamala Harris Advantages:

- Harris has bested Biden's poll numbers, and logged slim leads nationwide and in most swing states.
- Party seems energized to implement get-out-the-vote efforts.
  Donald Trump advantages:
- Republican structural advantage in the electoral college.
- His base still committed to him (high floor but low ceiling).
- Republicans have already launched a blizzard of voter lawsuits challenging voting rules & practices in key states/localities challenging voter legitimacy, rules to make voting easier, etc. in anticipation of post-election challenges.

# • These Republican challenges are being made in the name of voting integrity and security, to stave off "voter fraud" including voting by non-citizens (a federal crime).

- However, the 2020 election was one of the least fraud-free and most accurate in modern history.
- A 2016 study by the Brennan Center found that of 23 million votes cast in 2016 found only 30 cases of suspected non-citizen voting.
- A 2022 audit of voting in Georgia found that in the previous 25 years, about 2000 people who lacked citizenship documents tried to vote (average of 80 people per year). All were stopped from voting by officials. In 2020 and 2022 Heritage Foundation found 0 cases of voter fraud in Georgia.
- A 2020 Heritage Foundation study found 4 cases of voter fraud in Arizona.

- Outcome will hinge on two key factors:
  - Trump campaign versus Harris campaign ground games: i.e. get out the vote efforts.
  - Impact of voter suppression/litigation efforts.
- In 2016 Clinton lost while receiving 2.9 million more votes nationwide than Trump. Biden won in 2020 by nationwide margin of 7 million votes.
  - Winning "sweet spot" for the Democrats is between those numbers.
  - Republicans can win the presidency without receiving a majority of the popular vote nationwide (Trump 2016; Bush II 2000).

# Project 2025

A 922 page detailed manifesto for implementing a drastic and sweeping plan to remake the federal government, focusing mostly on Executive branch agencies and departments. If implemented it would be the most sweeping change in federal administration since the enactment of the Pendleton Act in 1883, which replaced the spoils system with merit-based criteria for selecting most government employees. Dismantle and politicize the administrative state:

- Increase number of political administration appointees from 4000 to 50,000 (Schedule F changes).
- Dismantle or privatize the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA), Dept. Homeland Security, FEMA, Head Start, Dept. of Education, privatize Dept. of Veterans Affairs, shrink EPA, dismantle Dept. of HUD, CDC. DOJ and FBI (labels the FBI a "bloated, arrogant, increasingly lawless organization") under more direct political control
- A majority of project's authors worked in Trump administration.
